Outside of family time and basketball, eye-banking and corneal transplantation in the US and abroad have become big passions of mine. I have assisted in corneal transplant teaching courses in the US, India, Australia, Hong Kong, South Korea, Brazil, Italy (see *picture*), Mexico, and Peru with the Cornea Society. The governing body that oversees seventy-six eye banks in the US, Canada, and Puerto Rico is The Eye Bank Association of America (EBAA), and it has fueled my passion for eye-banking. I have been a member of the EBAA Board of Trustees for the last two years, and I served as the Chair of the EBAA Accreditation Board for four years.

Under the umbrella of the EBAA, Atlanta's very own Georgia Eye Bank provides over 1,700 tissues annually: for patients in Georgia who are blind from corneal conditions, and additional corneal tissue for transplantation to medical missions and surgeons abroad. As the medical director since 2009, GEB and I are dedicated to raising awareness of the gift of donation and to providing Georgia's citizens and surgeons with corneas to restore vision.

Center For The Visually Impaired

An Eye Openers Spotlight

At age 74, advanced glaucoma had left Charles Thomas nearly blind in both eyes. He had come to rely on his sister for transportation, and if she was unavailable, plans would have to be cancelled. He



increasingly felt like a prisoner in his own home. Fortunately, his ophthalmologist introduced him to the Center for the Visually Impaired (CVI).

Charles' first appointment at CVI was with Nell, a community-based services case manager in the Florence Maxwell Low Vision Clinic (http://www.cviga.org/services/low_vision_clinic/), who assessed his needs and referred him to Ashleigh, one of CVI's certified orientation and mobility specialists.



During his first few one-on-one sessions, Charles learned how to safely navigate his environment, crossing streets, climbing steps and using escalators. Charles now has the confidence to travel on his own and perform other daily tasks independently, living life to its fullest, despite his vision loss. None of this would have happened without the initial referral to CVI from his ophthalmologist.

CVI is Georgia's largest comprehensive, fully accredited agency providing rehabilitation services for the blind and visually impaired. For more than 55 years, CVI has pursued its mission to empower people impacted by vision loss to live with independence and dignity.

Any person who is living with a loss of daily function due to vision

impairment is a candidate to benefit from vision rehabilitation. CVI is the only agency in Georgia that serves people of all ages and all degrees of vision loss, from birth throughout their lifespan. Many of the rehabilitation services CVI offers are unduplicated in the entire state of Georgia.

Ophthalmologists should not hesitate to refer patients with vision loss to CVI: the agency does not provide medical care and does not compete with ophthalmic practices.

CVI has a staff of certified experts including orientation and mobility specialists, occupational therapists, vision rehabilitation therapists, teachers of the visually impaired, Braille instructors and medical social workers, providing services that include orientation and mobility training, activities of daily living skills, assistive technology, support groups, diabetes and nutrition programs, vocational skills and career training, and children and youth services.



For patients who are unable to travel to CVI's main building in midtown Atlanta, a rotating network of satellite clinics offers the opportunity to receive services in other counties in metro Atlanta. Services can be provided in the homes of patients, who also benefit from access to a network of additional resources, support and information.

By partnering with CVI to refer at the point of initial diagnosis, ophthalmologists can stress what can be done for patients, as opposed to what cannot be done, and give hope to people with vision loss by providing a path to continued independence and an improved quality of life.

CVI is able to make a huge difference in the lives of patients with vision loss, but is dependent on the referrals of Georgia's ophthalmologists to do so. Once you've examined your patient and are in the process of making a treatment plan, please remember lowvision therapy and its benefits.

CVI has a range of easy and efficient ways for doctors to refer directly: our program marketing team can provide referral resources and
